The Powder Magazine Museum Mission

Through preservation and education, The National Society of the Colonial Dames of America in the State of South Carolina will promote The Powder Magazine, South Carolina's oldest public building, representing colonial history as a military arsenal.

Program Terminology

The National Society of The Colonial Dames of America in the State of South Carolina (NSCDA-SC) - Non-profit organization responsible for The Powder Magazine's preservation and educational mission-work.

The Powder Magazine Museum Council (TPM Council) - NSCDA-SC member-formed council that administers the preservation and education mission work of The Powder Magazine.

The Powder Magazine (TPM) – A museum owned and administered by the NSCDA-SC.

The Charlestown Battalion of Artillery (CBA) - A volunteer-based interpretive program of TPM.

Staff - Employees and volunteers permitted to serve TPM by authority of TPM Council.

Program - Initiative created to further TPM's mission and thereby serve the mission of the NSCDA-SC.

Interpretation - Communicating information that is both mission-based and meaningful to TPM customers.

The Powder Magazine (TPM) Museum Overview

The Powder Magazine (c. 1713), South Carolina's oldest public building, stored about five tons of gunpowder for the defense of colonial Carolina. This arsenal is the only standing component of the walled city fortification system that once surrounded Charlestown. Its unique design was intended to direct an explosion through an attic filled with sand. It served as a military facility through the American Revolution and periodically until the early 1820s.

Throughout the 19th century, The Powder Magazine was used variously as a print shop, wine cellar, livery stable, and storage facility. Since 1902 the NSCDA-SC has preserved this historic site. Programs are hosted both on - and off-site. The Powder Magazine museum is open to the public:

Monday – Saturday, 10:00AM – 4:00PM Sunday, 1:00PM – 4:00PM Closed on Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day \$5 Adults, \$2 Children, \$10 Group Rate (up to 5), \$25 Annual Family Pass (up to 5)



Description:

Learn the history and physics of 18th-century artillery. TPM volunteers bring reproduction artillery to your site and interpret the science/procedure of Colonial/Revolution-era cannon firing. TPM artillery volunteers must be qualified and appear in CBA regimental uniforms or other appropriate attire.

Volunteers Responsibilities & Conduct

CBA Recruiting Officer – Assists with marketing and communication between TPM and CBA volunteers. CBA Interpretive Program Officer – Program safety officer; assists with training and interpretation. CBA Volunteer Crew Member – Assists with programming (interpretation and demonstrations).

Responsibilities

- Must be a registered volunteer in order to participate in TPM programming.
- Participate and complete required training sessions.
- Willingness to interpret the CBA as it relates to the story of TPM, the state, and the nation.
- Purchase and maintain appropriate living history attire (see uniform section).
- Communicate with TPM management regarding programs, scheduling, training, and other concerns.
- Understand that official TPM-CBA programs must first be approved and then adhere to TPM policies.



Conduct

CBA staff/volunteers will be offering outreach (offsite) programming where TPM cannon is/are fired by trained Powder Magazine (NSCDA-SC) staff/volunteers – adhering to the same standards/safety regulations as the National Park Service. Demonstrations could potentially take place at both public and private locations with a 100-yard, unobstructed range. Cannon demonstrations will only be executed at locations where The Powder Magazine has received expressed permission from the site administrator (property owner, agency, etc.).

Safety range parameters and firing procedures will align with those of the National Park Service. Artillery crew members must complete a black-powder safety course administrated by an accredited entity such as South Carolina's Department of Parks and Recreation, The National Park Service, etc.

- In the event of a medical or criminal emergency, call 911.
- Volunteers and staff are prohibited from drinking during TPM programming.
- Smoking is prohibited during TPM programming.
- Inappropriate/profane language, discrimination, harassment, and illegal activities are prohibited.
- Volunteers and staff should appear in appropriate period-clothing (see uniform section). Unprofessional appearance which may distract patrons from appreciating the resource.
- Report all accidents and incidents of misconduct to TPM management.

Charlestown Battalion of Artillery Annual Schedule

Volunteers are required to participate in at **least 3 programs** per year, **1 of which** must be a **training date**. CBA may also be recruited for other programs/private events not listed below.

* Indicates a training date

*January – Artillery Training (Charles Town Landing, Charleston, SC)

February – Lowcountry Colonial Days (Colonial Dorchester, Summerville, SC - French & Indian)

*March – Spring Meeting and Artillery Training (Live Range, TBD)

April – War for Empire (Fort Dobbs, Statesville, NC – French & Indian)

May – Ashley River Festival (Colonial Dorchester, Summerville, SC – Revolutionary War)

June – *Night at the Museum* (The Charleston Museum, Revolutionary War)

*August - Artillery Training (Charles Town Landing, Charleston, SC)

October – 18th Century Trade Faire (Fort Loudoun, Vonore, TN - French & Indian)

*November – Fall Meeting and Artillery Training (Live Range, TBD)

December – Christmas Gunns (Colonial Dorchester, Middleton Places, etc. TBD)

Note! CBA may also be recruited for other programs at other historic sites and even private venues.

Uniforms & Period Clothing

We believe the CBA uniforms were influenced by British Royal Artillery regimentals. This image shows the patterns of the British uniforms in the mid-1700s:



Some of the French and Indian-era uniform colors are documented, but there is room for personal interpretation. What is known is that each artillery crew member was asked to tailor his regimental, therefore, slight variations are historically accurate.

Artillery Regimentals

Black felt tri-cornered hat with gold trim, wig or queue

> White shirt with neck-stock

Dark blue wool regimental, Crimson red facings, gold buttons, Brandenburg cuff

Crimson red wool Waistcoat, gold buttons

> Blue wool knee breeches, brass knee buckles

White stockings Riding boots or black leather shoes

with brass buckles



French & Indian Version

American Revolution Version Black felt tri-cornered hat with gold trim, wig or queue

White shirt with neck-stock

Dark Blue Wool Regimental, red facings, similar to Continental soldier, gold buttons

White linen waistcoat, gold buttons

Whiten Linen knee breeches, gold buttons on knees

White stockings

Riding boots or black leather shoes with brass buckles

The pattern used during the American Revolution is very similar to Continental Army regimentals, but with color variations and gilt buttons.

Militia Artillery

Felt hat, cocked or tri-cornered option

> White or checkered shirt, black neck-stock

Waistcoat and/or hunting frock

Canvas or linen knee breeches or pants

Stockings

Riding boots or black leather shoes with brass buckles
